Who can help me with insurance, work, or school questions?

Every dialysis center has a social worker who can help with insurance and payment issues. Whether you're working or in school now or want to go back, your social worker can link you up with people who can help.

Other sources of help:

- If you have health insurance through an employer, someone in human resources should be able to explain your coverage. It is best to keep your insurance if at all possible.
- Your insurance policy may have a toll-free consumer helpline.
- Your state's insurance office (in the government section of your phone book) is a resource for consumer complaints on insurance.
- Your state's Medicaid office can help you with Medicaid questions.
- Medicare has booklets that explain coverage for dialysis and transplant as well as other Medicare services.

What *I* can do to learn more about my insurance, work, or school options:

Make an appointment to talk to my social
worker about my concerns. Ask him
or her about help to pay my insurance
premiums through the American Kidney
Fund.
